# Proposal to amend the Practitioner's Supply Order rules relating to certain antibiotics for rheumatic fever prevention

PHARMAC is seeking feedback on a proposal to amend the Pharmaceutical Schedule General Rules regarding a Practitioner's Supply Order (PSO) in relation to the provision of certain antibiotics for the national Rheumatic Fever Prevention Programme (RFPP).

In summary, if implemented, this proposal would result in:

- The rule relating to a PSO in Section A: General Rules of the Pharmaceutical Schedule being amended to increase the quantity of certain antibiotics that can be ordered by practitioners for patients with suspected or confirmed Group A Streptococcal throat infections for the purposes of the RFPP
- Amoxycillin 500 mg capsules and phenoxymethylpenicillin 500 mg capsules being available on a PSO
- A reduction in administrative burden for practitioners when writing PSO's for antibiotic use under the RFPP.
- The dispensing pharmacy may be able to claim the multiple service fees for dispensing in course-specific amounts as per the Community Pharmacy Services Agreement (the **CPSA**).

The RFPP is being run in regions where there is a high incidence of rheumatic fever, namely Auckland, Hutt Valley, Northland, South Auckland, Waikato, Tairawhiti, Lakes/Bay of Plenty, Porirua East and Hawke's Bay. It is proposed that this proposal will only apply to patients with suspected or confirmed Group A Streptococcal throat infections being treated under the RFPP (in the above regions). If this proposal is implemented, practitioners would be able to order increased amounts of antibiotics specified in this proposal on a PSO for the purposes of the RFPP.

# Details of the proposal

PHARMAC is proposing to increase the maximum number of courses of certain antibiotics (detailed in the table below) available on a PSO.

# **Proposed Pharmaceutical Schedule changes**

The following Pharmaceutical Schedule changes are proposed with additions in bold and deletions in strikethrough:

Section A: General Rules

#### 5.2 Practitioner's Supply Orders

The following provisions apply to the supply of Community Pharmaceuticals to Practitioners under a Practitioner's Supply Order:

- 5.2.1 Subject to clause 5.2.3 **and 5.2.6**, a Practitioner may only order under a Practitioner's Supply Order those Community Pharmaceuticals listed in Section E Part I and only in such quantities as set out in Section E Part I that the Practitioner requires to ensure medical supplies are available for emergency use, teaching and demonstration purposes, and for provision to certain patient groups where individual prescription is not practicable.
- 5.2.2 Any order for a Class B Controlled Drug or for buprenorphine hydrochloride must be written on a Special Practitioner's Supply Order Controlled Drug Form supplied by the Ministry of Health.
- 5.2.3 A Practitioner may order such Community Pharmaceuticals as he or she expects to be required for personal administration to patients under the Practitioner's care if:
  - a) the Practitioner's normal practice is in the specified areas listed in Section E Part II of the Schedule, or if the Practitioner is a locum for a Practitioner whose normal practice is in such an area.
  - b) the quantities ordered are reasonable for up to one Month's supply under the conditions normally existing in the practice. (The Practitioner may be called on by the Ministry of Health to justify the amounts of Community Pharmaceuticals ordered.)
- 5.2.4 No Community Pharmaceutical ordered under a Practitioner's Supply order will be eligible for Subsidy unless:
  - a) the Practitioner's Supply Order is made on a form supplied for that purpose by the Ministry of Health, or approved by the Ministry of Health and which:
    - i) is personally signed and dated by the Practitioner; and
    - ii) sets out the Practitioner's address; and
    - iii) sets out the Community Pharmaceuticals and quantities, and;
  - b) all the requirements of Sections B and C of the Schedule applicable to that pharmaceutical are met.
- 5.2.5 The Ministry of Health may, at any time, on the recommendation of an Advisory Committee appointed by the Ministry of Health for that purpose, by public notification, declare that a Practitioner specified in such a notice is not entitled to obtain supplies of Community Pharmaceuticals under Practitioner's Supply Orders until such time as the Ministry of Health notifies otherwise.
- 5.2.6 A Practitioner working in the Rheumatic Fever Prevention Programme (RFPP) may order under a Practitioner's Supply Order such Community Pharmaceuticals (identified below) as he or she requires to ensure medical supplies are available for patients with suspected or confirmed Group A Streptococcal throat infections for the purposes of the RFPP in the following circumstances:
  - a) the RFPP provider name is written on the Practitioner's Supply Order; and
  - b) the order quantity should be specified in course-specific amounts; and
  - c) the total quantity ordered does not exceed a multiple of:
    - i) ten times the Practitioner's Supply Order current maximum listed in Section E Part I for amoxicillin grans for oral liq 250 mg per 5 ml, amoxicillin cap 250 mg and amoxicillin cap 500 mg; or

- ii) two times the Practitioner's Supply Order current maximum listed in Section E Part I for phenoxymethyl penicillin grans for oral liquid 250 mg per 5 ml, phenoxymethyl penicillin cap 500mg, erythromycin ethyl succinate grans for oral liq 200 mg per 5 ml and erythromycin ethyl succinate tab 400 mg; and
- d) the practitioner must endorse the Practitioner's Supply Order with the multiple order quantity (i.e. 10 x 300 ml amoxicillin grans for oral liq 250 mg per 5 ml), and the dispensing pharmacy may claim the multiple service fees as per the Community Pharmacy Services Agreement.

# **Section B**

AMOXYCILLIN

Note - the maximum quantity ordered on a PSO for providers in the Rheumatic Fever Prevention Programme (RFPP) may be up to 10 x the maximum quantity for amoxycillin. The RFPP provider name must be identified on the PSO. Please refer to rule 5.2.6 of Section A: General Rules of the Pharmaceutical Schedule for full requirements. #### ERYTHROMYCIN ETHYL SUCCINATE

Note – the maximum quantity ordered on a PSO for providers in the Rheumatic Fever Prevention Programme (RFPP) may be up to 2 x the maximum quantity for erythromycin ethyl succinate The RFPP provider name must be identified on the PSO. Please refer to rule 5.2.6 of Section A: General Rules of the Pharmaceutical Schedule for full requirements.

The RFPP provider name must be identified on the PSO. Please refer to rule 5.2.6 of Section A: General Rules of the Pharmaceutical Schedule for full requirements.

# The PSO process and community pharmacy dispensing

Some factors to consider relating to the proposal are that it is proposed that:

- The practitioner must endorse the Practitioner's Supply Order with the multiple order quantity for example, 10 x 300 ml amoxicillin grans for oral liq 250 mg per 5 ml.
- RFPP provider must be identified on the PSO.
- Community pharmacy should dispense antibiotics to providers as a course e.g. 10 lots of 30 amoxycillin 500 mg capsules. Antibiotics that require reconstitution should be given to providers in their original form along with appropriately sized bottles. Note: the Ministry of Health will provide labelling guidance to community pharmacy for dispensing antibiotics for use under the RFPP.
- The dispensing pharmacy may claim the multiple service fees as per the CPSA.

# Why is this being proposed?

The Ministry of Health have asked PHARMAC to look at ways to ensure at-risk patients with sore throats identified as part of the RFPP can be treated with funded antibiotics in a timely manner.

It is proposed that the changes will not apply to all antibiotics – only those specified in proposed rule 5.2.6. It is proposed that practitioners would be able to request the increased amounts of antibiotics for patients with sore throats as specified in this proposal only for the purposes of the RFPP.

## Background

A national RFPP is being implemented by the Ministry of Health (MoH) with the aim of reducing the incidence of rheumatic fever. The programme is a Government health priority.

The programme is focusing on regions where there is a high incidence of rheumatic fever namely Auckland, Hutt Valley, Northland, South Auckland, Waikato, Tairawhiti, Lakes/Bay of Plenty, Porirua East and Hawkes Bay carried out either within schools or community clinics.

PHARMAC is working with the Ministry of Health on ways to ensure at-risk patients with sore throats identified as part of the RFPP can be treated with funded antibiotics in a timely manner.
